Archaeology of Warfare; Teaching and Studying warfare in Archaeology of East Europe and West Asia, Late Bronze Age and Iron age

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The complex history of warfare across different periods and culturally diverse regions is an excellent source of information about the conflict in the human past. Warfare's history chronicles events (e.g., battles, invasions, sieges, post-wars) and simultaneously explores cultural milieux and related social variables that influenced when, how, and on what scale warfare was conducted in the past.

The study and teaching of warfare in the archaeological record require a level of synthesis, temporal depth, and rational analysis that challenges the abilities and knowledge of all archaeologists. Indeed, it is a field of study that merits an intensive investigation. The *Collegium,Institutd'étudesavancées de Lyon*, and *Archéorient (UMR 5133)*, in collaboration with the University of Lyon, Pars Institute of Art and Architecture, and Metropol Grand Lyon financial help, have organized a two-day workshop on the Archaeology of Warfare to provide the mechanism for such a multi-disciplinary inquiry.

This two-day event will bring together specialists and scholars from various institutions and universities with varying experiences to discuss and analyze multiple aspects of studying and teaching archaeology of warfare in the East Europe and West Asia, during the Late Bronze Age and Iron Age.

The primary aim of this workshop is to explore the development of warfare in mentioned geography at different times and in different regions due to the multidimensional nature of war in human society. This workshop will address different questions focused on six critical themes concerning warfare in archaeological studies:

- The theories and approaches relevant to the study of warfare and warfare-related material in archaeology.
- The study of weaponry and related technological and metallurgical research (e.g., metallography, elemental, and isotopic analysis).
- The constitution of armies, their warfare strategies, infantry and cavalry practices and techniques, recruitment, military hierarchies, and mobilization procedures
- The study of artistic iconography relevant to warfare and the development of weaponry
- The study of warfare and its historical record as known from textual sources
- The study of cultural experiences and rituals associated with warfare in the societies under discussion in the workshop.

Presentations and related discussions will address the fundamental question of "how frequent warfare affects the basic choices people make about where to live, whom to fight, how to defend themselves, on whom to confer power, and how to form social groups." These communications will provide a nonlinear perspective to characterize the nature of warfare as encountered in research and teaching from the Bronze Age to the Iron Age in the East Europe and West Asia.
